## BVL CELEBRATING 75 YEARS OF BOWLERS SUPPORTING VETERANS

In 1942 America, the war effort was in full swing; individuals and organizations were coalescing around the troops and one unique organization was being formed by a favorite American sport: Bowling.

Seventy-five years ago, officials representing every facet of the sport of bowling met to coordinate efforts to support the troops – bringing together all the sport’s integers to provide the most complete approach to the campaign. Thus, BVL, then known as The Bowler’s Victory Legion” was born.

BVL’s first Administrator, A.L. “Ebby” Ebersole noted in the minutes of that meeting:

“The Bowlers Victory Legion was organized on September 26, 1942 at the American Bowling Congress (ABC) office in Milwaukee when all segments of the bowling family met to unify their support of the war bond sales and other service-oriented endeavors such as the Red Cross and the USO. Besides ABC, the gathering included representatives of the Women’s International Bowling Congress, the High School Bowling Congress, the National Duckpin Bowling Congress, the Bowling Proprietors’ Association of American, the Billiard and Bowling Institute of America and the Candlepin and Rubberband Duckpin Groups and manufacturers.

E. H. Baumgarten of ABC was elected chairman and A. L. Eversole of the Duckpin Bowling Congress was the vice chairman.

Subsequently, Ebersole was appointed as BVL’s first Administrative Officer and oversaw BVL’s beginnings: The first projects focused on improving morale for troops overseas and insuring that wounded service men receive appropriate and timely healthcare. To support morale, BVL directed the delivery of 400,000 decks of playing cards, 325,000 sports guides, almost 100,000 fishing kits and a variety of sports equipment. Additionally, three medical evacuation planes were purchased to ferry the wounded home from the battlefields of Europe – known as the “Wings of Mercy” project.

When the war ended, BVL leadership recognized that the need to support those who have served our country was more important than ever and thus renewed their mission of recreation and health care for hospitalized veterans.

BVL then began working alongside the forefathers of today’s recreation specialists. In an interview with an acknowledged pioneer in the field for the Department of Veterans Affairs Dr. Bernath Eugen Phillips, writer Jeff Mansfield quoted Phillips recalling work for the VA in 1945, “The BVL was one of the first (organizations) that I got associated with when I went to Washington..we used the BVL and started a bowling tournament among all VA hospitals. The first BVL Tournament was held in 1947 and seven of the 31 VA hospitals were entered. A. L. Ebersole deserves the credit for brining this recreation therapy to the veterans. In 1947,

James E. Pixlee the Director of Athletic Service of the Veterans Administration wrote this about BVL “It is impossible to overstate the value of the aid afforded by BVL.”

By 1974, BVL had earned recognition as a leader in recreation therapy for veterans. That distinction was only furthered under the guidance of the National Bowling council in the ensuing years, which assumed the task as administrator of the sport’s charity. In 1996 when the National Bowling Council folded, the BVL Committee voted to move out into its own entity with Elaine Hagin at the helm. Currently John LaSpina is the Chairman of the BVL Board of Directors.

“BVL has evolved in its structure over the years to keep pace with the changing nature of veterans’ healthcare and recreation therapy techniques as well as changes within our sport” explains LaSpina. “BVL was created through the unity of all members of the sport of bowling.” Continues LaSpina. “that was the reason for our success. We want and need to get back to our roots. Thanks to our new campaign to encourage bowling center operators to participate in the BVL effort through Care.Commit.Contribute and to our innovative partnership with industry corporate members, we are headed in the right direction. But there is more work to be done.”

## 2017 OPEN CHAMPIONSHIP TOURNAMENT

Copperfield Bowl hosted the Open Championship Tournament in July over two weekends. There were 65 Teams and 220 Singles entries. Total prize payout for this tournament was \$7,816.00. The Doubles event of this tournament is different from traditional tournaments because bowlers do not actually bowl the event with their partner but participate in “virtual doubles” using the scores bowled in another event. Virtual Doubles was introduced at the first GHUSBC Open Tournament (held at Copperfield Bowl) in 2006 and bowlers loved the idea of being able to enter with several partners instead of participating in Doubles the traditional way.

The Handicap Team Champions were “Houston Hitman” with a score of 3095 and “Razzamatazz” was the Senior Team Champions with a score of 2869. The Scratch Team Champions were “In The Hunt” with a score of 2743.

Jean Amboree-Justice took the top honors for the ladies with score of 572 in Singles and 642 in Team and Clint Land led the way for the men with scores of 699 in Singles and 757 in Team. Congratulations to our Tournament Champions.

There were 211 entries in the Handicap Doubles with a total payout of \$2,110.00 and 209 in the Century Doubles (combined ages = 100) for a total payout of \$2,070.00. London Chenier and Cedric Ardoin won the Handicap Doubles with a score of 1641 and Israel Montemayor and Eric Firth won the Century Doubles with a score of 1603.

Youth bowlers participated in a separate Singles division winning a total of \$900 in scholarship money for their efforts. With 53 entries, the youth showed a 43% increase in their entries from last year. Joseph Gage was the Male Tournament Champion with a scratch score of 687 and Jessyca Powell-Driver was the Female Tournament Champion bowling a 649 scratch score.

## SOUTHERN BOWLING CONGRESS TOURNAMENT COMING TO TOWN - MARCH 2018

The Southern Bowling Congress was formed many years ago but as to the actual date that remains unknown. There is a medal located in Atlanta Georgia that showed the Congress has been in existence since the 1920's. The Southern Congress began with originally two states, Alabama and Tennessee. The first tournament that is currently known by the members now was held in Birmingham Alabama in 1939. The tournaments that followed were held in Memphis (1940), Knoxville (1941), and New Orleans (1942). The Southern disbanded during World War II.

The Southern was reorganized in 1947 by Heine Mallick, ABC Director of Memphis, Jack Ilgenfritz of Shreveport, E.L. Belisoma of Memphis and Rex Brown of Birmingham. This group met in New Orleans and it was then decided to reorganize. The Louisiana State Association and the Louisiana State Proprietors Association were meeting at the same time and they were asked to support the tournament and they agreed enthusiastically.

The founding purpose was to promote and foster the game of ten-pins and to create new friendships and amiable competitive bowling. The Southern grew to 12 states but has since reduced to 9 states. The states are Texas, Arkansas, Alabama, Louisiana, Tennessee, Florida, Mississippi, Kentucky and Georgia.

Largely due to the high level of interest in bowling in these southern states, the Southern Bowling Congress Tournament has grown to be the largest sectional tournament in the South. Interest in the Southern is high and the meetings are

well attended. The Southern usually hosts between 500 to 700 teams each tournament. It is held over 5 weekends usually in the month of March extending into April.

The Southern Bowling Congress is proud to support youth bowlers. To aid with their education, the SBC has established the Jacques Curwen/Jay Guidry/Bill Blackburn Scholarship Fund and is offering a one year \$750.00 scholarship to the college of their choice. To date the SBC has distributed over \$106,000.00 in scholarships to youths to help support their education. The scholarship is available to any senior youth bowler and meets the requirements. The 81st Annual Southern Bowling Congress Handicap Tournament will be held in Houston this year at Alpha Bowl and Armadilla Lanes from March 3- April 8.


Thus far, the 2017 campaign has resulted in donations of \$6,088.27. A huge thank you to all of the bowlers who made a donation to BVL.

## LEAGUE CHAMPIONS IN INVITATIONAL TOURNAMENT

The 1st Annual League Champions Invitational Tournament was held on June 17 & 18 at Alpha Bowl. There was a small turnout but most of the bowlers who participated liked the concept and hoped they would win first place in their league so they could participate again. In this tournament, there are two team divisions – handicap and scratch. Only teams who win first place in their league are eligible to bowl in this tournament for the chance to earn “bragging rights” for the center in which the league bowls. There were 26 handicap team entries and no scratch team entries which is only 16% of our leagues. Hopefully next year that number will increase significantly. A crystal pin sponsored by Mike Austin’s BOWLING DYNAMIX Pro Shops will be on display in the center to show where the tournament champions bowl.



The Adult Handicap Team Champions are “Suicide Clique” from Copperfield Bowl with a total of 3547. Members of the team were Danny Brown (675), Roy Stills (530), Eric Rosenquist (646), Reginald Moses (662) and Justin Maxwell (775) bowling a scratch score of 3288.

In the Youth Division, “Just Do It” from Tomball won the top honors with a handicap total of 3287. Members of the team were Ty Tiner (455), Michael Brooks (525), Matthew Huynh (355), Nick Price (496) and Joseph Ontiveros (495) for a scratch total of 2326.

Crossover Doubles was offered as an additional event during the tournament. Congratulations to our winners Roy Stills & Justin Maxwell with a handicap score of 1439.

done on a strictly volunteer basis. He has spent almost as much time at our office as I have since the storm.

## ACCORDING TO RULES

### RULE 9 – BOWLING ON THE WRONG LANE

In a league or tournament play, a dead ball shall be called and the player or players required to rebowl on the correct lane when:

1. One player bowls on the wrong lane
2. One player from each team on the pair bowls on the wrong lane.

If more than one player on the same team bowls on the wrong lane in turn, all deliveries stand as bowled. Upon discovery, bowlers shall complete subsequent frames on the correct lanes.

### RULE 12 – APPROACHES MUST NOT BE DEFACED

The application of any foreign substance on any part of the approach that detracts from the possibility of other players having normal conditions is prohibited. This includes, but is not limited to talcum powder, pumice and resin on shoes and/or soft rubber soles or heels that rub off on the approach.

If a league participant uses a substance and somebody complains that it prohibits him/her from having normal conditions, the

league officer should require the individual to immediately stop his/her action. If the individual refuses, games shall be subject to forfeiture.



## COMMONLY ASKED QUESTIONS

### RULE 120 – POSITION MATCHES

**IF A TEAM BOWLS AGAINST THE WRONG OPPONENTS DURING THE POSITION ROUND OR REGULAR SCHEDULE, CAN THE GAMES BE BOWLED OVER OR CAN THE SCORES BE COMPARED WITH THE PROPER OPPONENTS?**  
USBC holds the games stand as bowled and are entered in the record for games won or lost as well as for individual averages. The league continues with the regular schedule after discovering the error. Comparing scores with the proper opponents changes the competitive circumstances under which the match was bowled.

### CAN A SUBSTITUTE BE USED IN A POSITION ROUND?

Yes, a substitute may be used provided the league has not adopted a rule stating otherwise.

### HOW ARE POSITION MATCH PAIRINGS DETERMINED WHEN TEAM FAIL TO MAKE UP POSTPONEMENTS(S) OR ALL TEAMS IN THE LEAGUE HAVE NOT BOWLED THE SAME NUMBER OF GAMES?

When postponed games have not been completed before a position match or all teams have not bowled the same number of games to date, the secretary determines team pairings on a percentage of wins and losses when scheduling the position match. Percentages are based on the number of points a team has the opportunity to win as compared to the number of points actually won. Team standings are determined by dividing the total number of points a team competed for into the number of points actually won.

## BOWLINGS GENTLE GIANT

Edwin W. (Bill) Fisher  
 1925 – 2017

Edwin William Fisher passed away peacefully at the age of 92 on November 2, 2017 with his beloved wife Ebby by his side. Bill will be remembered as a "Gentle Giant" of our sport because of his kind demeanor and presence throughout the bowling community in Houston.

At the age of 15, Bill was introduced to bowling while he worked as a pin boy in his hometown of Trenton, New Jersey. He loved to fish, but bowling was his sport. An avid bowler, Bill bowled in the local, state and national Tournaments. He received recognition for his 58 years of participation in the National Tournament and was so looking forward to his 60th tournament. He became interested in the administrative side of bowling when he moved to Houston to work on his PhD at the University of Houston. He served for 46 years on the Houston Bowling Association Board of Directors and was awarded a Life Membership, but remained active in the local association after the merger to GHUSBC. Bill's service to bowling extended beyond the local level where he served as a member the American Bowling Congress Board of Directors. He was the Jurisdictional Director of S.E. Texas for 21 years and at the end of his term he was elected as a Life Member of ABC.

Bill was instrumental in re-establishing the Houston Bowling Hall of Fame in 1973 and served as its Co-Chairman or Chairman until his death. He was inducted in the Houston Bowling Hall of Fame in 1976 and was elected as the first non-coach to the Greater Houston Coaches/Parent Bowling Hall of Honor in 1990. In 2005, Bill was elected to the Texas State Bowling Association Hall of Fame and to the Southern Bowling Congress Hall of Fame in 2009. In addition, he was the first non-Latin selected to the Houston Latin-American Bowling Association as an honorary member for his assistance and support of their tournaments.


