GHUSBC HOLDS 2018 ANNUAL CHAMPIONSHIP TOURNAMENT

Each year the annual Championship Tournaments for men and women are held during the month of February. The Doubles & Singles events were held at Diamond Lanes and the Team event was held at AMF Windfern. Entries were somewhat down this year, possibly as a result of the people who were still recovering from damage due to Hurricane Harvey.

The Men's Invitational Tournament had 103 teams with 21 of them in the Scratch Division, 168 Doubles of which 42 were Scratch, 336 Singles with 92 Scratch bowlers and 259 Handicap All Events entrants plus 114 bowlers in Scratch All Events. The total prize fund for this tournament was \$36,049.00.

The Women's Championship Tournament had 57 teams bowling in a single division with 115 doubles and 230 singles bowling in two divisions.

There were 31 Scratch Singles entries, 224 Handicap All Events and 32 Scratch All Events entries for a total prize fund of \$19,698.00.

The 2018 GHUSBC City Champions are Kerry Moreland and Ronald Ramicone.

Men's Invitational Tournament Results:

"Willow Four" took the top honors in the Handicap Team division. Team members Demarcus Alexander, Timothy Anderson, Walter Patterson III and Richard Turner rolled a score of 3059 and received prize money in the amount of \$1,500.00. The Scratch Team honors went to Gullettes

Guerillas with a score of 2968 and a prize check for \$760.00. Team members were Ronald Ramicone, Fred Barnes, Kenny Gullette and David Roundtree.

In the Doubles event, Christopher Hance and Sam Caskey combined for a handicap score of 1549 to take the top prize in the amount of \$900.00. Finishing a close second were Theo Jacquet and Lashovious Smith with a score of 1543 and \$500.00 in prize money. Kenny Gullette and Ronald Ramicone combined to roll a 1447 to lead the Scratch Doubles field and they received a prize of \$500.00. Handicap Singles honors went to Michael Gibson with a score of 801 and \$900.00 in prize money while

David Scardaville was the Scratch Singles winner with a score of 784 and \$400.00 in prize money. The Handicap All Events Champion was Justin Viernes with prize money in the amount of \$250.00 and the Scratch All Events title went to Ronald Ramicone with a 2160 score and prize of \$100.00. The 2018 Men's Invitational City Champion title goes to Ronald Ramicone who averaged 240 for the tournament.

Women's Championship Tournament Results:

"Another Ten Pin" led the team event with a score of 2880 in the Women's Championship Tournament. Team members Mary Harris, Shelly Haley, Mary Roden and Darlene Stewart received prize money in the amount of \$700.00.

Doubles, Singles and All Events are bowled in two divisions: Doubles Division 1 - 340 & Above and Division 2 - 339 & Below; Singles and All Events Division 1 - 170 & Above and Division 2 - 169 & Below.

The Division 1 Doubles winners were Janet Sutton and Sonya Warren who combined to bowl a handicap score of 1506 and \$300.00 in prize money. Division 2 honors belong to a mother/daughter duo, Elizabeth Freeman and Julia Freeman with a handicap score of 1518 and \$600.00 in prize money. In Division 1 Singles the title belongs to Julia Freeman with a handicap score of 776 and a \$300.00 prize while Division 2 Singles honors belong to Shelly Haley with a handicap score of 857 and \$450.00 in prize money. Kerry Moreland was the

Scratch Singles winner rolling a score of 694 and receiving a \$150.00 prize.

Julia Freeman was the Division 1 All Events winner with a handicap score of 2330 and prize in the amount of \$120.00. Top honors in the Division 2 All Events belong to Shelly Haley along with prize money in the amount of \$225.00. Kerry Moreland is the 2018 Women's City Champion averaging 226 for a score of 2034 and \$130.00 in prize money.

IT TAKES A VILLAGE TO PUT ON THE LUCI

To many, it's the Luci Bonneau Memorial Bowling Tournament or The Luci for short. More formally, it's the Professional Bowlers Association/Professional Women's Bowling Association Striking Against Breast Cancer Mixed Doubles Tournament.

No matter what's it's called, it has and continues to be produced by a large group of people who care about bowling and helping the cause. The 50-60 volunteers from Houston, other areas of Texas and beyond are led by two people - Donna Connors, who founded the event in 2000, and Jim Welch, the tournament's manager since its third year.

They collectively make sure the now four-day event runs smoothly. There's an

enormous amount of logistics required beyond the main competition itself. There's hotel arrangements, putting on the barbecue dinner, conducting raffles, holding the program, selling merchandise, and preparing for the television finals.

"We have volunteers from every-where who come in and work," Connors said. "The good thing about it is I have everything done from January to July and put the whole thing together in a form. Then on the day of the event, everybody comes into play and then everybody goes to their positions and we make it happen. That's what makes it so beautiful.

"Once the tournament starts that day, I have to be honest, it is much bigger than any of us. I can't even describe it. When it starts rolling down the hill, there's no stopping it. It's just a beautiful thing which is driven by something much higher than any of us."

Connors, a former professional bowler and co-owner of a pro shop with United States Bowling Congress Hall of Famer Carol

Norman, works full-time as an account executive for a freight logistics company, so planning things is second nature to her. For the Luci, it begins with a written template in her computer.

"I'm very OCD about stuff so I look at it in January and February when I begin filling in the players," she said. "March, April, May and June is my target to fill the program. In March, April and May I start raising the funds for the tournament. Then I collect all the donations for the prizes we're giving away."

Along the way she's communicating with Welch who assigns players to the four squads. Any bowlers who can't bowl at their designated time can seek their own switches with other competitors and let Welch know.

That basically wraps up Welch's work until he and his six-person North Texas crew arrive in Houston the day before the pro-am. They meet Connors for dinner to go over last-minute logistics including



staffing. Once on-site, he spends much of time troubleshooting problems posed to him by Connors.

“Of course, Donna being Donna she always has new wrinkles once we get there,” Welch said.

Welch, a long-time, nationally known tournament manager whose full-time job is running leagues and tournaments for Bowlmor AMF in the Dallas-Fort Worth area, normally charges a monetary fee for his services. When Connors asked him to take over as tournament manager he agreed to do it for a simple fee – Diet Dr. Pepper.

“Every year when I go down there the first thing I see is there’s a cooler full of Diet Dr. Pepper,” he said. “I actually take vacation when I go down there because I’m not working for the company at that time but it’s a charity deal so that’s how I get to do it. The whole bowling community down there pulls together.

“My role is minor. The No. 1, No. 2, and No. 3 people who run that event are named Donna Connors.”

Connors starts the pro-am, then has a group of volunteers to do the auction, people to collect money, people to sell raffle tickets. The first year of the tournament, her late mother Kathryn and a friend raised \$3,000 in a coffee can “and thought they had raised millions.”

“We try to find fun things for the players because that’s the thing for me is that this tournament is about the players,” Connors said. “It’s always been about the players and always will be about the players because without the players, I don’t have a pro-am. Without the pro-am, I don’t have a charity and charity begins at home and the players deserve the best. This event truly is the bowlers’ tournament.”

The Luci has sold out every year since starting with two squads and 64 teams at the 32-lane Dynamic Lanes in 2000. When that facility closed about 10 years ago, it moved to the 44 lanes at Palace Lanes then owned by USBC/PBA Hall of Famer Bill Lillard and jumped to 84 teams.

A few years later a third squad was added expanding the capacity to 120 teams. Then four years ago the PBA offered a regional title and it continued growing. When PBA offered a national title four years ago and then USBC offered a PWBA national title last year, it grew to 152 teams.

When Lillard sold the facility in 2016, the name changed to the Bowl on Bellaire. Unfortunately, things didn’t work out for the new owners and the center closed after last year’s event which is why it’s being held this year at Copperfield Bowl with a record field of 160 teams scheduled including players from Europe and South America.


“I call it an event. I don’t call it a tournament anymore,” Welch said. It happened a few years ago when it went from two squads to three squads and later added a Friday night option. “People now come in 2-3 days early.”

Even with the change in venue, Connors was able to sell out the pro-am on top of the main event.

“It’s our first year here and will be a little different but we’re excited about it,” she said. “It wasn’t a choice of ours but we had to move and had to do something. It’s the biggest center around to be able to do what we do.”

With the help of Welch and their volunteer team, it’s sure to be another success this year.

Editor’s note: The tournament at Copperfield was very successful last year. In 2018 the tournament again will be held at Copperfield Bowl July 26th -29. Entries for the Pro-Am events can be found on the UCanBowl2 website.



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HOUSTON BOWLING HALL OF FAME INDUCTS TWO NEW MEMBERS

The Houston Bowling Hall of Fame tried something a little different for the 2018 Induction ceremony and although there were not quite as many people in attendance there were almost as many as in past years. Sunday, February 11th at 4:00 PM members of the Houston Bowling Hall of Fame crowded themselves into the Insuperity Club at Constellation Field in Sugar Land, Texas, home of the Sugar Land Skeeters. Members were joined by proprietors, USBC Southern Regional Manager, David Fields and several members of the Texas State USBC Hall of Fame along with many guests to see Lee Lorts and David Scardaville inducted into the local Hall of Fame.

LEE LORTS - Superior Performance

Lee was born in St. Louis, Missouri but moved to Houston when he was 6 months old. His dad bowled in a league when Lee was 15 years old and got his whole family involved. But Lee's interest waned until he was about 18 and then he would go to Little York Lanes and watch some of the "real bowlers" such as Larry Thompson and Rick Cosgrove bowl pot games. That got his competitive juices flowing and, if truth were known, he probably emptied their pockets of quite a bit of cash. Since then Lee has been one of the premier bowlers in the city.

- 2014 - 1st Place Team, Singles & All Events in the Firefighters Olympics
- 1st Place All Events - Men's Invitational Tournament and bowled a 300 game in Singles
- 2015 - 1st Place - Team, Doubles & All Events & 2nd Place in the Texas Firefighters Olympics
- 1st Place Doubles in the World Fire & Police Games in Fairfax, Virginia
- 1st Place Doubles in the "No Days Off" 3000 Tournament
- 2017 - 1st Place Team & 2nd Place All Events - Men's Invitational Tournament

Recently, Lee had rotator cuff surgery after falling on the lanes. He recalled another time when he had a fall bowling and left a 7 pin as he looked over to see the ball hit the pocket and missed his 300 game. Presently, Lee is a Captain in the Houston Fire Department.

DAVID SCARDAVILLE - Superior Performance

David was born in the small town of Valley Mills, New York but around age 6 moved to Waco, Texas. Influenced by their father, David and his two siblings started bowling. David is proud to say that up until a few years ago, his 87 year old father still bowled. When David was 14, the family moved to Valdosta, Georgia where David went to high school. After bowling all through high school, he began bowling in men's leagues. He attended college at Georgia Tech where his team finished 9th in the National Championship Tournament

in 1987 in Omaha, Nebraska. Graduating with a Chemical Engineering degree and an MBA from Georgia Tech in 1989, he was offered a job in Houston. When he moved to Houston he said he "never had a doubt that he would be bowling."

Some of his accomplishments include:

- 2015 1st Place in PBA50 Tomball Open and selected as SW PBA 50 Bowler of the Year.

David has numerous other tournament titles and has also served as the President of the Fair Lanes South way/Emerald Classic All Star League and again held that title at Emerald Bowl from 2005 - 2016. He had participated in 25 National Tournaments and holds a lifetime average of over 200.

CELEBRATE NATIONAL BOWLING DAY - AUGUST 11

The bowling industry will celebrate National Day on Saturday, August 11, 2018 by offering consumers a free game at participating bowling centers across the country. Consumers will be able to go to GoBowling.com to find participating bowling centers and download a coupon for a free game during the month of August.

The celebration will begin on Saturday,



August 5 at the Monster Energy NASCAR Cup Race at Watkins Glen. GoBowling will be represented by the No. 10 Stewart-Haas racing car driven by Aric Almirola. The Almirola car will be wrapped in a bowling lane theme design complete with a bowling ball and pins and the GoBowling logo. The television show FOX & Friends which broadcasts from 6-10 a.m. EST will set up bowling lanes on the set and feature bowling throughout the broadcast on National Bowling Day.



USBC SETS NEW SPECIFICATIONS FOR BOWLING BALLS

Following three years of research on how technology has affected the sport of bowling USBC has established new specifications designed to sustain the playing field both currently and in the future. The new specifications will be implemented over the course of the next two seasons.

A new specification has been established for the oil absorption rate of bowling ball coverstocks and a specification to eliminate balance holes while increasing static weight allowances also has been approved. In addition, new rules will be put into place to allow only a dry towel to be used to clean bowling balls during competition will go into effect on August 1, 2019. The specification for the increases in static weights take effect on January 1, 2020 which will allow bowlers the opportunity to plug balance holes prior to the elimination of balance holes starting August 1, 2020. With the elimination of balance holes, bowlers may have up to five holes for gripping purposes and all gripping holes MUST be used on every delivery. For more

ACCORDING TO RULES

Rule 104a Team Captain's Authority

A team captain is a member of the league authorized to organize and enter a team in league play. The captain is the team representative and shall perform the following duties:

1. Determine the members of the roster and be responsible for the eligibility of the team and its members under the rules of the league and USBC.
2. Collect, USBC, state and local association dues where applicable from each team member and remit such fees to the league secretary.
3. Be responsible for the conduct and attendance of the team in league play. It is within the captain's authority to remove any player from the team. If requested, good and sufficient reason for the removal must be furnished to the board.
4. Enter the lineup in the computer and/or on the recap sheet before the start of each schedule series
5. Sign the recap sheets and the scores verified by the opposing captain
6. Be responsible for the collection of league fees from each member of the team for remittance to the league treasurer
7. Pay each member of the team within 15 days after receiving prize money in accordance with verbal or written agreements. The league board shall decide a dispute over prize money.

Youth Leagues: The captain is elected by the team and only responsible for Items 5 & 6.



COMMONLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Rule 116 – Scores

Does the league board have to meet before an error can be corrected?

When an obvious error is to be corrected, a directive from the board is not necessary; a league officer is authorized to make the changes. However the board of directors decides on questionable errors in scoring calculation.

Is there a time limit for correcting errors in scoring or calculation?

Corrections can be made until the prizes are distributed.

Can an error on a score sheet or recap sheet be corrected after the team captains have signed the sheet?

Yes, their signatures do not prevent a score from being corrected. An officer is required to correct errors if they are found after the captains have signed the recap sheets. Both captains should be notified of the corrections.

What happens when scores are lost?

Scores that can be documented or agreed upon by the opposing team captains stand and the game shall resume from the point of interruption. Scores that cannot be documented or agreed upon by the opposing team captains shall be re-bowled unless the board of directors rule them null and void.

A team's scores were accidentally erased in the 8th frame of the first game. A printout was not available, so the secretary allowed the team to reconstruct the scores. Is this correct?



If the teams in question are able to agree, the scores could be reconstructed and if necessary the games continued. If the official record is mutilated, lost or defaced or the captains cannot agree on the scores, the games shall be re-bowled.

2017 GHUSBC YOUTH CHAMPIONSHIP TOURNAMENT

There were 58 team entries and \$5,000.00 was awarded in scholarship money for youth bowlers in Team, Doubles & Singles and All Events. Tournament Champions were Dakota Dudley Cassandra Hernandez. Dakota is a member of the Copperfield youth program and he rolled a score of 2135, averaging 237 for his nine games. Cassandra Hernandez bowls in the Armadilla II youth program and she roll a score of 1854, averaging 206 for her nine games.

Entry #47 was the Scratch Team winner with a score of 2570. Team members were Christian Garcia, Kaden Rogillio, Julian Salinas and Robert Lazo. Cody Goodman and Kaden Rogillio were the Scratch Doubles winners with a score of 1387. Singles winners were Ethan Gomez with a score of 763 and Cassandra Hernandez rolled a 729. Ethan's score of 763 featured a 289 game giving him top honors for High Game and High Series in the tournament. All of the Tournament champions as well as the Division champions will be invited to the Hall of Honor banquet to receive their plaques and scholarship monies.

Additional scholarship money of \$1125.00 was awarded in the Eliminator and \$200.00

total was awarded in a random draw to one bowler on each squad making \$6,325.00 the total amount of scholarship money awarded in the Youth Championship Tournament.


